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## **HIV Resources for Low-Income Clients**

### **Introduction**

This guide was created by the National Center for LGBTQ Rights (NCLR) with the goal of providing basic information about HIV to legal organizations and attorneys who serve low-income clients. The guide also lists resources that may be useful to low-income clients and potential clients, with information about HIV prevention and treatment.

### **Why HIV Education and Resources Matter**

HIV disproportionately affects low-income individuals. Barriers to healthcare access, housing instability, and lack of insurance coverage, as well as higher rates of substance use disorders and higher risk sexual contacts all increase the risk of contracting HIV and of not receiving or receiving inadequate treatment for HIV. Living with HIV in turn can have a negative impact on socioeconomic status, including risk of discrimination in employment and housing, limits on employment imposed by disability benefits, and a lack of accommodation for healthcare needs in the workplace or other contexts. A CDC study indicates that individuals residing in counties with the highest levels of poverty have the least favorable outcomes, including the highest HIV diagnosis rates, the lowest percentages of adults who accessed HIV medical care within 1 month of receiving a diagnosis, and the lowest percentages of adults with suppressed viral load within 6 months of receiving an HIV diagnosis ([CDC](#)).

Early testing, prevention, and treatment reduce HIV transmission and significantly improve health outcomes for those with HIV. While individuals living with HIV still face stigma, there are many free and low-cost programs that help individuals access HIV testing, prevention medications such as PrEP, and treatment regardless of income or insurance status.

### **Risk factors for HIV**

[\*\*Getting Tested for HIV | HIV | CDC\*\*](#): People with certain risk factors should get tested more often. You should get tested **at least once a year** if:

- You're a man who has had sex with another man.
- You've had anal or vaginal sex with someone who has HIV.
- You've had more than one sex partner since your last HIV test.
- You've shared needles, syringes, or other drug injection equipment (for example, cookers).
- You've exchanged sex for drugs or money.
- You've been diagnosed with or treated for another sexually transmitted infection, hepatitis, or tuberculosis (TB).
- You've had sex with someone who has done anything listed above or you don't know their sexual history.

## **Preventing HIV Transmission**

**PrEP & PEP:** PrEP (Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis) is a highly effective medication taken by HIV-negative people to prevent contracting HIV. When taken as prescribed, it lowers the risk of getting HIV from sex by about 99% and from injection drug use by at least 74% ([HIV.gov](#)). PEP (post-exposure prophylaxis) is the use of HIV medicines to prevent HIV infection within 72 hours (3 days) **after** a possible exposure.

**Barrier Methods:** Barrier methods for preventing the spread of HIV work by creating a physical block that prevents contact with potentially infectious bodily fluids (such as semen, vaginal fluids, and blood) during sexual activity.

**Treatment as Prevention:** Treatment as prevention is an HIV prevention strategy where people living with HIV take daily antiretroviral therapy (ART) to reduce their viral load to an undetectable level. People living with HIV who take HIV medicine as prescribed and get and keep an undetectable viral load will not transmit HIV to their HIV-negative partners through sex ([HIV.gov](#)).
